Book Review An Unfinished Love Story Doris Kearns Goodwin

As a baby boomer growing up in the 60's and 70's, and as someone who has a history minor with a great love of reading fiction and nonfiction about the subject, I figured that reading this book would be more nostalgic than edifying. But in reading <u>An Unfinished Love Story</u>, I realized I didn't know much about the era at all!

This book was quite a revelation to me—how arrogant I was to think I knew so much about the era! The story is told in flashback style. As Richard Goodwin, Doris' husband, is beginning to struggle with his health, they decide to go through hundreds of boxes of memorabilia of his adult life.

A bit of background on this power couple:

Richard was a Tufts and then Harvard Law graduate. As an idealistic young man, he began clerking for Supreme Court Justice, Felix Frankfurter. In 1959, he joined Senator John F. Kennedy's staff (one of the youngest!) quickly moving up the ladder to becoming one of his speech writers. He helped JFK form the idea of the Peace Corps and was with him when he delivered the idea at the University of Michigan. After the presidential election, Goodwin took on various duties as special counsel on Latin American Affairs. He was one of Kennedy's staff that opposed the order of the Bay of Pigs operation. As he moved up in importance, he became very friendly with both JFK and his wife, Jackie. After the assassination, Jackie asked him to arrange the eternal flame at JFK's grave at Arlington. Goodwin stayed on at the White House working with the new Peace Corps and writing Lyndon Johnson's speeches. He was the one to come up with naming LBJ's agenda "the Great Society." Goodwin loved this exciting time as he felt he was actually involved in so much change for the better in American society. But by 1965, the war in Vietnam became the overarching focus of the country. Goodwin decided to quit working for LBJ and began working with Robert Kennedy. When Kennedy decided not to run for election, Goodwin guit politics to teach and write books and articles critical of the war. He also decided to get involved with Eugene McCarthy's campaign for president, which only lasted until Kennedy changed his mind and Goodwin went back to work with him. They became close friends, which, of course, ended in tragedy with Kennedy's assassination. He was briefly married, had a son, and then separated as his wife's mental illness became more pronounced and she finally committed suicide. That was the end of his involvement in politics and he continued to write and teach.

Doris was a Colby College and Harvard University graduate. She was invited to work in Washington, D.C. as a White House Fellow. She lost the position quickly when it was found out that she wrote a derogatory article about LBJ, but he liked her so offered her a position in the Department of Labor. LBJ hired her for a staff position focusing on anti-poverty when he decided

not to run for president. After the election she was hired as a professor at Harvard University and commuted to Texas to help LBJ draft his memoirs. Her first book was a biography of LBJ, Kearns continued to write and received the Pulitzer Prize in Literature for a biography of Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt. Many other awards were earned over the years! I enjoyed another of her books, the <u>Team of Rivals</u>.

The two met at Harvard in 1972 while Doris was teaching there and Richard was writing a book. Even though they were often at the same place at the same time, they didn't know each other earlier. They married in 1975 and continued to lead high-powered and interesting lives. When Richard retired and was diagnosed with multiple health problems, they decided to tackle the hundreds of boxes he had accumulated over the years. He saved everything. Every speech, newspaper article, memo, letter (both sent and received), campaign memorabilia, clothing, everything! Doris was working on the biography of LBJ, so found the information useful, but as they delved deeper, she decided to also write a book about their combined experiences in politics, hence An Unfinished Love Story.

At times, reading this book felt like watching the movie Forrest Gump—Richard and Doris seemed to be involved in almost every important event or person in modern history! They were both idealistic, hardworking, and incredibly smart! They were remarkable people living in tumultuous, historic times and this book does an excellent job of capturing that. A good read!


Historic New England
