








Founded in 1935 under the name National Allied Publications, DC Comics is credited with starting the boom in popularity of Superhero Comics with the introduction of Superman in Action Comics #1 in 1938. Followed up by the introduction of Batman in Detective Comics #27 in 1939, DC has maintained its position as one of the oldest, largest, and most beloved comic book publishers in the US. 






Similar to the Superhero genre, Horror comics found their footing in the late '30s to early '50s until the establishment of the infamous Comics Code Authority in 1954. The most prominent titles came out of EC Comics, which is most well known for Tales from the Crypt. The genre blossomed in the underground comics scene, surging back into popularity in the '70s. To date, horror comics still continue to be one of the most popular and influential Comic Book genres. Check these stories out if you like a good scare!




So You Want to Read... Ton-Fiction ...Comics














Prior to the late '80s, when Art Spiegelman's Maus was released, comics were not measured on equal footing with other art forms outside of fan spaces. They were "for children," or were seen as lesser by others instead of as an artistic form of storytelling. While untrue, some of these beliefs still permeate today. Many people continue to argue about whether or not reading comics and graphic novels counts as "reading," but the argument in favor of comics is made stronger by award-winning nonfiction stories like those presented here.
